#### COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides students with an opportunity to apply knowledge and skills from theory courses to working with individuals and families in a community setting. Opportunity will be provided for students to become more familiar with the role of the HCA within a Home Support Agency and gain abilities that will prepare graduates to assume the role of a Home Support Worker.

### **PREREQUISITES**

Admission to the HCA program. <u>Completion of ALL term one HCA courses</u> (should be in term 2 lab ( HCA 141) concurrently.

### **LEARNING OUTCOMES**

Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to

- provide person-centred care and assistance that recognizes and respects the uniqueness of each individual resident or client
- enhance/maintain client independence within the community and related to self-care needs
- use an informed problem-solving approach to provide care and assistance that promotes the physical, psychological, social, cognitive and spiritual well-being of clients and families
- provide care and assistance for clients experiencing complex health challenges
- provide care and assistance for clients experiencing cognitive and/or mental health challenges
- interact with other members of the health care team in ways that contribute to effective working relationships and achievement of goals
- communicate clearly, accurately and in sensitive ways with clients and families within a variety of contexts
- provide personal care and assistance in a safe, competent and organized manner
- recognize and respond to their own self-development, learning and health enhancement needs
- perform the care-giver role in a reflective, responsible, accountable and professional manner.

### **COURSE FORMAT:**

This course takes place in a work setting and involves the application of theory to practice. Practicum will occur in selected 'home care' agencies and/or related community settings. These work experiences will be variable in length and time and occur on various days during the week. Each student must complete 60 hours (minimum) of practicum. Practicum time may include learning in lab/simulation settings when appropriate.

#### **ASSESSMENTS**

This course is graded as Pass/Fail.

All evaluative components for this course are mandatory and must have a passing grade (usually a minimum of 50%) Or Pass grade indicated for each component in order to receive a passing grade.

All components must be completed *within TWO weeks* of completing practicum shifts.

### Attendance & Participation

Regular attendance for practicum and any lab/classroom sessions is essential for successful completion of this course: Please refer to Student Handbook (Info for Practicum section) and other Home Care Practicum handouts, for details of attendance and other practicum requirements.

### Assignments:

- Reflective Workbook
  - Students will complete a reflective workbook comprised of regular reflective reports that identify significant learning and insights into practice.
- Client Case Study and Work Plan
  - Students will complete a comprehensive case study and work plan to assist a chosen client with home support needs.
- Student Skills Log Booklet Students will maintain an up to date skills summary booklet (the same one used for HCA 140, 141, 160) to document progress and competency throughout their practicum.

### **HSW Buddy Feedback**

Home Care staff (Home Support Workers) are buddied with students and will give verbal and written feedback to staff on your performance related to practicing of skills and professionalism. Buddies complete these in confidence; you are NOT permitted access to these forms. HSW will also give verbal feedback to the practicum instructor

### **Instructor Evaluations**

Instructors will assess and evaluate student progress using a variety of methods such as staff feedback and meetings with students.
