COURSE DESCRIPTION

As members of the education support team, educational assistants play a significant role in supporting children and youth with learning challenges. This course will examine a range of technology-based adaptations, from low-technology solutions to specific software applications. Participants will learn to use these technologies to support learning and enhance the capabilities of students in the classroom. This course will cover the essential concepts, key terms and multiple approaches used to match students and their learning needs to appropriate adaptations. Participants will acquire the knowledge and skills to implement adaptations that support students to achieve greater independence and participation in the classroom.

PREREQUISITES

Acceptance in the Education Assistant Certificate Program, or permission of instructor.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion students will be able to:

- a. Explain key terms and concepts related to assistive technology;
- b. Identify and describe the purpose of a range of assistive technologies currently available in Yukon schools;
- c. Demonstrate basic skills with a range of assistive technologies and adaptations designed to meet educational goals and specific learning challenges;

DELIVERY METHODS/FORMAT

Classes will include lectures and a computer lab component.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS/EVALUATION

Attendance

Much of the learning in this course is experiential, therefore, attendance is essential. As stated in Yukon College's Academic Regulations:

Major assignments will be discussed at the beginning of the course and presented in writing with criteria clearly defined.

- 1. Contact the instructor promptly and in advance of due dates if you have questions or concerns regarding assignments.
- 2. Extensions for assignments are granted only for special circumstances. Make a request to the instructor at least three days prior to due date. Marks will be deducted based on 5% per day. No assignments will be accepted later than two weeks past the due date and not more than 3 days after the final exam.
- 3. All written assignments, unless otherwise stated, must be double-spaced and typed in Times New Roman font 12 on standard paper. Spelling, grammar and content organization are reflected in the grade. APA references may be required.
