COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course focuses on classroom applications of recent theory, research and practice in the teaching of writing for elementary pre-service teachers. Study of the writers' processes and strategies will be examined through participation in a writing workshop.

Course & Delivery Format

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This course will be delivered online through Microsoft Teams. Students will be required to attend all scheduled online classes as well as complete an assortment of synchronous and asynchronous online activities. There will be a mix of whole and small group activities with a focus on learners' participation in activities. A supportive and collaborative writing community will be encouraged as students become "writers" in the class. Students will have activities to complete independently or in groups online from 1:15pm*- 2:45pm and then attend online class from 2:45-4:15pm.

Students are required to turn on webcams and microphones for the entirety of the class to participate in class activities and discussions as well as be an engaged learner in the course.
