COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course focuses on basic drawing skills, the materials required to draw, and how to prepare and transfer designs to create a card and wood carving. In the relief carving segment, students will learn carving design, techniques and appropriate tool usage to apply designs, to shape and form wood, and to apply finishes. Students will develop quality control standards for each project.

COURSE FORMAT

This skill-based course will be a total of 45 class hours and will be taught using hands-on learning techniques, small group work, class discussions, elder involvement, peer learning, demonstrations and audio-visual aids. Dependent on time availability, field trips may occur to community partners' locations to offer students a unique cultural learning experience.

ASSESSMENTS:

Attendance & Participation

Attendance and participation are an essential part of the learning process in this course. Because experiential exercises and other activities are such an important component, success in the course is dependent on a high level of participation. If students miss classes or experiential activities, they may be advised to withdraw prior to the withdrawal deadline.

Assignments

After learning specific carving and drawing techniques, how to transfer designs and apply finish, students will be required to complete two projects. A relief carving from wood and a card will be designed, decorated and finished.
