COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course surveys the development of Europe from the French Revolution to the end of the Cold War. Attention is given to political, economic and military affairs, as well as cultural and intellectual developments in Europe.

History 121 explores major political, economic, cultural and social events that occurred in Europe between 1789 and 1980. The course is divided into two parts. Part I focuses on the European historical era from the French Revolution, 1789, to the outbreak of World War I. Part II focuses on the modern European era from World War I, 1914 to the Cold War, 1980. History lectures will focus upon events of war and revolution, political and social theories, ideologies, class structure, and women's history.

Students will leave the course prepared for more advanced history and humanities courses.

With conscientious application students will:

- Acquire knowledge about major themes in European history 1750 to 1980.
- Develop an understanding for the complexity of historiography.
- Develop analytical and critical thinking skills through research and writing.
- Gain practical experience as historians through exploration of various documents and writing formal researched historical essays.

COURSE FORMAT (3/0)

The course is designed to develop student research and analytical writing skills, to develop student confidence in their abilities to orally describe their research and writing experiences, and to encourage students to explore alternative methods of researching and presenting Europe's political and social history.

The course will be presented in a lecture/seminar format. Students are responsible for discussion of inclass assignments, required readings, and individual research and writing. Lectures will include student presentations, instructor presentations, discussions and film. Individual research engendered by the assignments will provide students with opportunities to chose the historical events, themes or society, as well as the style of research and presentation, they wish to explore.

ATTENDANCE

Students are expected to regularly attend class.

COURSE COMPLETION REQUIREMENTS

All evaluative components for this course are compulsory and must be completed in order to pass the course. A passing grade on the final examination is also required.

WRITTEN ASSIGNMENT REQUIREMENTS

All written assignments for this course must be word-processed and conform to the conventions of academic writing. Marks will be allotted for form as well as content, and consideration will be given to grammar, spelling, sentence structure and essay organization. A general rule of thumb is one idea per sentence. Referencing must conform to APA specification found in the guide in the library and available in class.

Students are required to submit assignments in class or to the A&S office not later than the due date and advised to keep their research notes and a back-up copy of all assignments until the end of the semester.

PLAGIARISM

It should be noted that plagiarism (academic dishonesty) is a serious academic offence and will result in your receiving a mark of zero on the assignment or the course. In certain cases, it can also result in dismissal from the College. Plagiarism involves representing the words of someone else as your own, without citing the source from which the material is taken.
